Remembering Ina Lee Stephen Leaving a Legacy— Making a Difference

Three years ago, RCVA received an unrestricted bequest of \$25,000 from the estate of Ina Lee Stephen. Her gift has been essential during the last two years when federal grants for shelters have been radically reduced.

Ina Lee's interest in helping victims of abuse grew from her own experience.

She was born in Charlottesville and attended Arlington High School. She left school to be married, and her husband proved to be violent and abusive. As a very young woman in an era when shame was added to the pain of victimization and divorce was difficult to obtain, she suffered for several years before she was able to leave.

Ina Lee obtained a divorce, earned a General Education Diploma and began a new life. She met Richard Stephen, a World War II veteran, and in 1949 they were married.

Richard and Ina Lee moved to California where they lived from 1960 to 1986. Ina Lee worked in passenger relations with TWA-Hertz Auto Rental at Los Angeles International Airport. Richard was employed by Quality Assurance TRW. Following retirement, in 1988, they returned to Rush County. Both were members of Trinity Presbyterian Church.

Ina Lee followed closely the news of RCVA and the establishment of Phoenix House. She was grateful to know that help was now available to others in circumstances similar to her own early life and chose to leave a generous bequest, following her death in 2011, to further our work.

Ina Lee continues to make a difference for good. Through her generosity she helps improve lives in Rush County!
